

About the Clement Loop Trail:

The Clement Loop Trail, a 1.5-mile loop trail located in remote northwestern Corinth, was built in 2009 by the Corinth Conservation Commission and many volunteers and with the support of the New England Grassroots Environment Fund, the Wellborn Ecology Fund, the National Park Service, and the Orange County Headwaters Project. Trail access is generously granted by the landowner, Dartmouth College. Please respect the landowner and the trail: hiking, skiing, bicycling, horse-back riding, etc. are all welcome but motorized vehicles of any kind are prohibited.


The Clement Loop trail is named after the Clement family, whose homestead foundations can still be found in the area. Notice the signs located at various points along the trail, pointing out various trees and shrubs. The well-managed, rich hardwood forest is part of a large network of conserved land in this part of town, home to a diversity of wildlife, from fishers and flying squirrels to deer, moose, bear, and coyote.

Directions: From Cookeville (Corinth Post Office and Town Hall), travel about 2 miles. Just before the Cookeville Rd. turns to dirt, make a right on Maplewood Rd. Stay left at the intersection with Joe Lord Rd. (road becomes 4th class and is unplowed in winter) and travel half a mile. Just around the sharp bend to the right is the trail parking, on the right. The trail departs to the immediate left of the kiosk, heading up into the woods. After a short ways, the trail splits. Either direction will take you back to the split.




